KART PRESENTS Watch the Sun Turn to Gold

Featuring the works of Maria Hupfield and Jason Lujan On view October 14 - December 9, 2022



K Art is pleased to present, Watch the Sun Turn to Gold, a duo exhibition of works by Toronto-based artists Maria Hupfield (Anishinaabe-kwe of Wasauksing First Nation) and Jason Lujan (Chiricahua Apache and Mexican).

Watch the Sun Turn to Gold investigates the artists and their endeavors in cosmopolitanism and communication systems. Maria Hupfield utilizes industrial grey felt – a neutral medium – as a contemporary vehicle for artistic liberation. Jason Lujan seeks communicative transparency in painting and sculpture to build relationships with the unfamiliar. In various media, both turn to the Sun to reflect and uncover new possibilities of expression and unity.

Most notable are that both artists represent themselves rather than their collective. They haven't presented their work alongside one another since 2016. Since then, they cofounded and presented work under Native Art Department International, a collaborative project focusing on communication platforms beyond identity-based artwork.







Maria Hupfield

MARIA HUPFIELD (she/her) is a Toronto-based artist and transdisciplinary maker working with Industrial felt at the intersection of performance art, design, and sculpture. She is currently the inaugural ArtworxTO Legacy Artist in Residency with the City of Toronto, Ravines, and a Mellon Fellow, Center for the Imagination in the Borderlands, Arizona State University, USA, 2022. This follows her inaugural Borderlands Fellowship for the project Breaking Protocol at The Vera List Center for Art and Politics at the New School and the Center for the Imagination in the Borderlands at Arizona State University (2020-2022). A recipient of the Hnatyshyn Mid-career Award for Outstanding Achievement in Canada (2018), she exhibited and performed her work in Nine Years Towards the Sun at the Heard Museum, Phoenix, 2019-2020, and The One Who Keeps on Giving (organized by The Power Plant 2017-2018) her first major touring solo exhibition. She has exhibited extensively, including recently in New York, USA, at CARA (Center for Art Research and Alliance), Abrons Art Center, and in Toronto, Canada, at the Art Gallery of Ontario and Patel Brown. Hupfield is Martin clan and an off-rez member of the Anishinaabe Nation belonging to Wasauksing First Nation, Ontario, Canada (Robinson Huron Treaty), and appointed Canadian Research Chair, Transdisciplinary Indigenous Arts at the University of Toronto.

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Jason Lujan

Jason Lujan is originally from Marfa, Texas. As an artist, he creates tools for understanding and interpreting the processes by which different cultures approach each other due to travel and communication, which are later homogenized. Primarily integrating visual components rooted in North America and Asia, the work focuses on the possibilities and limitations of exchanging ideas, meanings, and values, questioning the concepts of authorship and authenticity.

Jason is an Assistant Professor at OCAD U and one of two artists behind Native Art Department International (NADI), a project in collaboration with Maria Hupfield. He has exhibited at MKG127 (ON), the Amon Carter Museum (TX), Museo Nacional de Culturas Populares (CDMX), Art Mur (QB), Museum of Contemporary Native Art (NM), and International Print Center (NYC). Professionally, he has contributed to, planned, and managed exhibitions at the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the Dia Art Foundation, the Museum of Modern Art, and the Park Avenue Armory.







You are Lost in the Desert (Green Version), 2022 Acrylic on Cutting Mat on Wood Panel 16 x 20 in, Panel Mounted


